Immunize Kansas Coalition – Shutting the Door on HPV Cancers

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Program Overview: HPV infection is common. About 80% of adults who have had sex become infected with HPV at some point in their lives, but most never know they have the virus. Every year in the United States, 34,800 women and men are estimated to be diagnosed with a cancer caused by HPV infection. HPV vaccination could **prevent more than 90% of cancers caused by HPV**—estimated to be 32,100 cases ever year—from ever developing. Health care providers play a vital role in increasing HPV vaccination rates which will protect against infections that cause six types of cancer. This module focuses on effective communication techniques health care providers can utilize to effectively recommend the vaccine and address questions.
